## GO WilMa! Outdoor Adventure Program a Hit!

The inaugural *GO WilMa!—Get Outside Willistown and Malvern* outdoor adventure program was incorporated into the K-5th-grade *Dream Big—Read!* national summer reading program at Paoli and Malvern Libraries. Modeled after the York County-wide Get Outdoors York program, the *GO WilMa!* program featured hidden “stars” (posts with raised rubbing plates for “stamping”) throughout special places in Willistown and Malvern. Children were provided Captain’s Logs containing clues leading to the stars plus interesting facts, nutrition tips, safety tips, reading suggestions, and places to stamp their logs.

Under the leadership of Willistown Parks and Recreation, the program team, including Paoli Library, Malvern Library, and Paoli Hospital, brought *GO WilMa!* to life. Many thanks go to our star hosts: Malvern Borough, Paoli Battlefield Preservation Fund, Malvern Business Association, Paoli Hospital, Willistown Parks and Recreation, Sugartown Strawberries, and Willistown Conservation Trust.

Folks got outside! Record sign up at both libraries totaled 586 children and their accompanying adults, friends, and family star seekers. 823 prize raffle tickets represented at least that many trips to the hidden stars. Approximately 617 miles were travelled by each of the star seekers and their fellow travelers on their astrological missions.



## Recycling “Stats”

The U.S. recycling rate for aluminum beverage containers leaped from 58.1% in 2010 to 65.1% in 2011, according to the Aluminum Association, the Can Manufacturers Institute, and the Institute of Scrap Recycling Industries. The 65.1% rate equates to 61 billion cans and easily makes the aluminum can the most recycled beverage container. The goal of the industry is to reach a 75% rate by 2015.

## Bye, Bye Plastic Coke Bottle

Well, not immediately, but get ready just the same! Beverage giant Coca Cola is accelerating its effort to replace its current petroleum-based plastic bottles with its “PlantBottle,” made from nonpetroleum-based renewable resources such as corn, sugar cane, beet sugars, corn stalks, and pine tree scraps. Coke has been making the PlantBottle since 2009 and has already sold 10 billion of them in 20 countries. Just so they don’t delete the old-style glass bottle!!

**Specifications:** Wood other than as described above will not be chipped, i.e., we will not accept wooden furniture, ladders, fence posts/railings, telephone poles, landscaping wood, construction wood, paneling, scrap wood, or any wood containing nails, hooks, or metal. These types of wood will have to

be taken home if brought in for chipping. Also, we will not accept leaves or grass.

## King Street Redevelopment Project


Builder David Della Porta and developer Eli Kahn are behind the 1,400 foot stretch of new construction on King Street in Malvern Borough. According to Eli Kahn, the mixed use buildings will include retailers such as The Whip restaurant, a coffee house, an art gallery, a women’s clothing store, another restaurant and 190 luxury apartments with off-street parking. Kahn is looking to wrap up construction by summer’s end 2013.

A state-of-the-art 5,000 square foot Kimberton Whole Foods is being proposed in the Willistown Township portion of the development. ## Avoid Sewage Grinder Pump Repair Fees

If you are in a low-pressure area and have a sewage grinder pump, please read the following: The low pressure, sewage grinder pump at your home is capable of grinding and pumping solids found in typical household wastewater. Willistown Township maintains and repairs residential grinder pumps as part of your sewer maintenance fee. However, this service comes with homeowner responsibilities.

The box at right lists items that should not be disposed of via your home’s sewer system through the drain, toilet, or garbage disposal unit.

Introduction of these materials may cause a system failure and/or premature wear upon the mechanical elements of the system. We suggest you retain this list and remind members of your family about the items that are prohibited. With your cooperation, PreDoC, our service contractor, strives to maintain normal

operation of all the municipality’s pump stations and prevent malfunctions to the system at your home.

Any service calls and related costs resulting from any of these materials having been placed in the low-pressure grinder pump system will be the responsibility of the homeowner. You will receive an invoice for the repair work.



**From the Chief**

I hope everyone had a great summer! Remember, school is back in session, and I ask you to take extra care while driving on our roadways. Since we have many children walking to their bus stops, we've resumed our checks of those stops. If you see our officers at your child's bus stop, and wonder what is happening, it is our effort to keep our children safe!

Once again, we've had an increase in thefts from unlocked vehicles. As a result, our call volume has spiked this year. Please, take time to make sure you lock your car so we can reduce this type of crime. We really need your help with this. During their investigations of these thefts, our officers find that most owners do not have the make, model, and serial numbers of their electronic equipment. Please take time to record this information and store the information in a safe place.

As I stated earlier, we are up over 14% in call volume for the year. With this increase in call volume our officers have shown why I believe they are the best at what they do! They've done an outstanding job investigating and solving crimes and keeping our community safe. Your support of the Willistown Police Department is the main reason they are able to do such a great job. Many officers from other departments comment on the great relationship we share with our residents. As always, I'm glad to hear so many positive things from you about our officers. We've always received tremendous support from you. Our Board of Supervisors has always been there for us

and has provided us with the necessary tools to be one of the best police departments in Chester County. As Chief of Police, I thank you for standing behind us, and you can be sure we will continue to provide you with the service you deserve.

If you have recently moved to Willistown, you may not know that we are staffed 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. We have detective and traffic units, and our patrol division is staffed by a sergeant on each platoon. We have officers trained in accident reconstruction and criminal investigations, and we have officers assigned to the West Chester Area Regional Emergency Response Team. These officers are highly trained and are under constant review to maintain their position on this team. Inclusion on this team has benefited Willistown numerous times. We take our training seriously so we can provide you with the best police protection!

**Municipality Cost Recovery Fee Update**

Mark Rupsis, Chief Operating Officer for the Chester County Commissioners, reported that as a result of feedback and correspondence with many municipalities and numerous discussions with township and borough officials and first responders, the Chester County Commissioners have decided not to pursue the originally proposed method of the municipality emergency services cost recovery plan that was determined on a population

basis at roughly \$5.20 per resident (as reported in the previous *Towne Crier*).

Rupsis stated that the County pledges to work with municipal officials to review additional methods of municipality cost recovery for the investment in the many emergency services projects and the upgrading of major equipment—all of which will help to maintain an extremely high level of safety for all Chester

County citizens. Any resulting proposal for cost recovery will be communicated to the municipalities and discussed in a future Commissioners' Sunshine meeting prior to a vote at a Commissioners' meeting. The County appreciates the many comments on the topic and welcome further suggestions, either directly or via municipal officials.
